Early Literacy in Pre-School

What is my child learning in the school district's early literacy pre-school program?

Teachers at your child's pre-school are working very hard to develop your child's reading readiness skills. The Minnesota Early Childhood Indicators of Progress document provides a list of early learning standards in many areas, including literacy and language. Your child's pre-school teacher is using the Houghton Mifflin Pre-K "Journeys" Language Arts program – the same program that is used in Grades K – 6 in Bemidji. Before this program was chosen, administrators and teachers made sure that it contained the instructional pieces necessary to teach all of the recommended early literacy skills. Please contact your child's teacher to view the "scope" (skills taught) and the "sequence" (order skills are taught) of Pre-K "Journeys".

How Do Teachers Know What My Child's Early Literacy Abilities Are?

In order to be sure your child is learning important literacy skills, pre-school teachers will screen, or assess, him or her several times a year. This assessment can help teachers determine the instruction your child needs. Your child's literacy skills in the following areas may be checked: 1) Demonstrating Positions (on, under, over, etc.); 2) Rhyming, 3) Printing his or her name, 4) Identifying Upper and Lower Case Letters, 5) Recognizing own printed name, 6) Saying the Alphabet, 7) Printing some Alphabet Letters, and 8) Showing an Interest in Books and Stories. If you have a question about your child's assessments, please feel free to contact your child's teacher. Note: The district's pre-school staff members are considering the implementation of a new screening tool. Please check back for changes.

How Do I Know If My Child is Ready for Kindergarten?

Whether or not to send your child to kindergarten is an important decision. Children will have more success in kindergarten if they are ready for the skills they will be taught in class.
